

Keep Communities Healthy by Investing in the Public Health Workforce Loan Repayment Program

he public health workforce —the backbone of our nation's governmental public health system — is facing a crisis that predates COVID-19 but worsened during the pandemic response. Public health departments were hit hard by the 2008 recession and despite some progress between 2016 and 2019, local health departments lost 21% of their workforce capacity in the decade before the pandemic.¹ A recent analysis found that local public health departments need at least 54,000 more full-time equivalent positions — an increase of 70% — to provide a minimum set of public health services.² That estimate encompasses only the bare minimum needed to sustain the public health system, without accounting for additional workforce that may be temporarily required to respond to an emergency like COVID-19.

The need to expand the local health department workforce is compounded by pressures that may lead existing workers to leave the field. A 2022 analysis found that nearly one-third of the public health workforce is considering leaving their organization in the next year, mostly for reasons other than retirement, including pay, work overload and burnout, lack of opportunities for advancement, stress, and organization-

al climate and culture.³ Combined, these forces create an urgency to address our public health workforce crisis by better supporting existing staff and bringing new staff into the field.

Congress Can Help

Congress recognized the challenges facing the public health workforce and included bipartisan legislation in the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023 to establish a Public Health Workforce Loan Repayment Program that will offer up to \$150,000 in educational loan repayment program to public health professionals who have graduated within the past 10 years with a range of degrees vital to the needs of a 21st century public health workforce like public health, epidemiology, data systems, informatics, or statistics. The program is modeled off the successful National Health Service Corps program and will offer an important tool for health departments to recruit and retain top talent to tackle public health challenges today and in the future. However, the program cannot get off the ground without sufficient funding. Congress can help by fully funding the Public Health Workforce Loan Repayment Program in Fiscal Year 2024.

Fully Fund the Public Health Workforce Loan Repayment Program

Congress passed bipartisan legislation last year to address the public health workforce crisis by creating a loan repayment program for public health professionals who agree to serve three years in a local, state, or tribal health department, but dedicated funding is needed. Please support full funding of the program in Fiscal Year 2024. An annual appropriation of \$100 million could allow as many as 2,000 public health professionals to receive up to \$50,000 in student loan repayment benefits, helping health departments to recruit and retain top talent.
